Church Family News: 11<sup>th</sup> – 18<sup>th</sup> February 2024

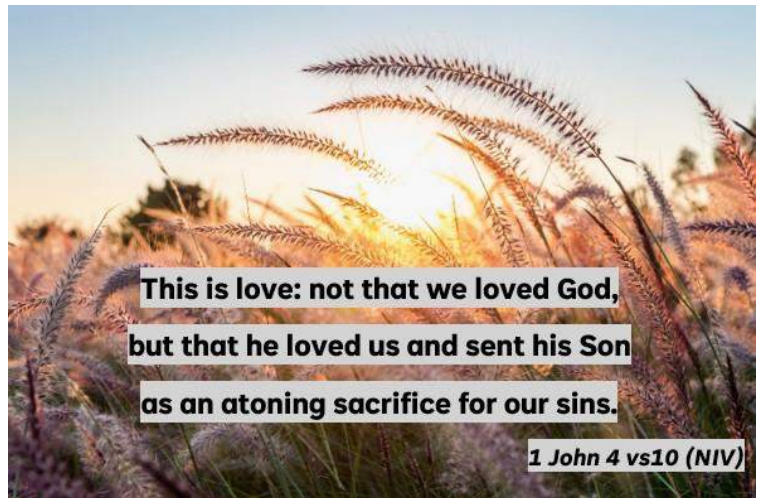
Today we are starting a Bible teaching series entitled “Loving God and Loving Others”. Over the coming weeks we will be focusing on prayer, generosity and sharing the good news of Jesus.

The reason why we can love others is because of God’s wonderful love for us, so that’s our starting point today.

As 1 John 4v10 (see right) makes clear, God’s love is completely different to normal human love. Watch any romantic comedy or listen to any pop song about love and you will find that people love someone because they make them feel good, because they are a wonderful person or because they give them good things. That’s how human love works, we love things that are good.

God’s love is different in that he set his love upon us even when we were his enemies, even when we were walking in sin. God loves people who are to him ugly, unattractive and have nothing good to offer him. God loves people who hate him. He makes the first move and starts a relationship with us. What amazing love!

Yet he doesn’t leave us there. Rather, he gave us the greatest gift imaginable, his own Son, to die for us, to wash us clean of all we’ve done wrong and to give us a new start with him. As a result, we’re able to love him and we’re able to love others too. So during this teaching series let’s be seeking and praying to grow in our understanding of God’s love for us and to grow in our love for him and others and to work this out in practical ways.

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## Sermon Sheet

**11<sup>th</sup> February 2024**

**Preacher: Ben Wilkinson**

### Opening prayer

Help us this day, O Lord, to hear your words and know your voice so that we may live our lives for you.

### Reading: 1 John 4.7-21

#### God's love and ours

<sup>7</sup> Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. <sup>8</sup> Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. <sup>9</sup> This is how God showed his love among us: he sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. <sup>10</sup> This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. <sup>11</sup> Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. <sup>12</sup> No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

<sup>13</sup> This is how we know that we live in him and he in us: he has given us of his Spirit. <sup>14</sup> And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Saviour of the world. <sup>15</sup> If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in them and they in God. <sup>16</sup> And so we know and rely on the love God has for us.

God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them. <sup>17</sup> This is how love is made complete among us so that we will have confidence on the day of judgment: in this world we are like Jesus. <sup>18</sup> There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love.

<sup>19</sup> We love because he first loved us. <sup>20</sup> Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. <sup>21</sup> And he

has given us this command: anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister.

## Sermon

Our question today is: **What is real love?**

The shops at the moment are full of boxes of chocolates, bunches of roses and special greeting cards, because Wednesday is Valentine's Day. What does Valentine's Day tell us about what the world around us thinks love is all about?

I have here a couple of Valentine's Day cards. The first one has a panda bear on the front and it's a classic pun: "Life without you would be un-BEAR-able!"

The second one is a bit more cheeky: "To my boyfriend, you've got it all... brilliant smile... brilliant personality... brilliant body...". Inside: "...brilliant Girlfriend!" "Happy Valentine's Day"

It's a bit of fun, but even these Valentine's Day cards tell us something about why people love each other. The way it normally works is that we love someone else, because of how they make us feel, or because of how good they are, or because of what they give us.

This is what the Valentine's Day cards tell us. I love you because you benefit me in some way. And if you watch any romantic comedy or listen to any pop song about love, that is how it will normally go. I love you because you are good for me in this way or that way.

But what we're going to see today is that God's love doesn't work like that. God's love is far deeper and greater. And anyone who receives God's love is called to love others in the way that God loves.

Why are we thinking about all of this today? Between now and Easter we have a series of Bible teaching all about growing in love. We're calling it "Loving God and Loving Others". We're going to be thinking about really practical topics like prayer and generosity and sharing the good news of Jesus with others. But how can we love God and love others? It all starts with God's love for us, as our passage today tells us.

I'm not going to be able to cover every detail of our Bible reading today, so we're going to focus on verse 7-12. And there are two big questions that are answered in these verses:

1. Where does real love come from?
2. How do we live out God's love?

## **1. Where does real love come from?**

We see here that the source of love is God himself. Verse 8 contains these amazing words: "God is love".

### **a. God is love**

It's not just saying God shows love. It's not just saying God does loving things. More than that, God himself is love. Love is the essence of his being. Think of a nugget of pure gold freshly dug out of a gold mine. Yes you could say "this nugget looks golden". "This nugget has the properties of pure gold." But more than that, if you cut it open or if you melt it down you will find that it is gold. So with God, God is love in the essence of his being.

Our passage mentions the three persons of the Trinity. The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. We know from the Bible that there is one God in 3 persons and the Trinity helps us understand how we can say that "God is love". Because for all eternity the Father has perfectly loved the Son and the Son has perfectly loved the Father and the Father and the Son perfectly love the Holy Spirit and the Holy Spirit perfectly loves the Father and the Son.

So the 3 persons of the Trinity are bound together by perfect love. One love. One God. God is love. It's the essence of his being – the eternal loving relationship between the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Where does real love come from? Love comes from God. Because God is love. But God doesn't just keep his love within the Trinity, God's love flows out to others. So this is the second part of the answer:

### **b. God loves the unlovely**

The first half of verse 10 puts it like this:

*"This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us"*

If God loved in the way that people normally love, then God wouldn't love anyone else, because God is perfect and we humans are far from perfect. We are rebels against God. We have turned away from God and wanted to run our lives in our own way. It's what the Bible calls sin.

Earlier in this letter, in chapter 1v8, John writes:

*“If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.”*

So we are not lovely to God. Quite the opposite. And God doesn't need us – he is self-sufficient. And yet God, who is full of love, chooses to set his love upon us. And the wonderful thing about this is that it means that we don't need to try to earn God's love.

Normally if we want someone to love us we know that need to make ourselves more attractive to them in some way, whether that's making more of an effort in how we dress, or saying nice things to them, or to help them, or give them a nice gift.

But with God, we can't earn his love, we have nothing to give him and he's not attracted to us sinners. But God chooses to make the first move and set his love upon us, even though we deserve the complete opposite. The Bible calls his God's grace. His love that we don't deserve. It's a free gift, we cannot earn it.

God loves the unlovely. And not only is God's love a free gift, it's also the most generous gift imaginable.

### **c. God's love gives everything**

Let's read the whole of verse 10 now:

*“This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins.”*

How much does God love us? So much that he's given us everything – his very self – the Son of God – as a sacrifice when he died on the cross.

Why do we need this sacrifice? Because we are the ones who deserve to die. More than that, because of our sin, we deserve the eternal judgment of God, as we saw last week.

Notice, Jesus is *“an atoning sacrifice for our sins.* The idea of an “atoning sacrifice” means a sacrifice that takes the punishment that we deserve in our place. Imagine a football match where one player fouls another player really badly. There is no dispute, he deserves the red card, to be sent off. The referee gets the red card out of his pocket, but then the player who was fouled gets up and says, “No, give me the red card, let the player who fouled me stay on.” And so he's sent off instead. Well that wouldn't ever happen in football! The rules wouldn't allow it and the fans certainly wouldn't allow it, because we just don't think like that.



But this is what God did. We deserve the red card of his judgment because of our sin against him and yet stepping into our place, in the person of Jesus, when he died on the cross, he took the punishment we deserve. God could not have given us more. Verse 9:

*“This is how God showed his love among us: he sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him.”*

How do we receive this love? We need to admit that we are sinners. We need to acknowledge that we deserve God’s judgment. And we need to ask Jesus to take the punishment we deserve on himself through his death on the cross. When we do that we are completely forgiven by God and we are welcomed into his family.

We cannot earn God’s love, but we need to receive it as a free gift. If you’ve not yet done that, this is an offer to you today. You don’t need to try and be a better person to deserve it, because we can’t earn it – it’s a free gift.

If you’d like to know more, why not come on our Christianity Explored course and we can look at the message of Jesus and the evidence for Jesus, together?

Well I know that many of us have received God’s love. And if we have then God doesn’t want us just to store up his love, like water in a garden pond, rather, he wants his love to flow through us and out to others, more like a garden hose. As verse 11 says:

*“Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.”*

So this is our second big question today:

## **2. How do we live out God’s love?**

### **a. Because God lives in us**

Imagine a guest comes to stay with you and this guest is Mary Berry, the TV chef. Mary Berry specialises in baking. If she came to stay at your house you can imagine she would gladly find the oven, find the fridge and get baking some nice fresh cakes. Soon the smell of those cakes would waft around the house and out of the window. And if she just carried on baking, before long there would be far more cake than you need. So you’d start giving it out to others.

If we have received God’s love for us in Jesus, then we have a very special guest living inside of us. This is none other than God himself.

We see this in the second half of verse 16:

*“God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them.”*

Can you see that. God, the God who is love, live inside of us. How can that be? Well this is where the Holy Spirit comes in. Look with me at verse 13:

*“This is how we know that we live in him and he in us: he has given us of his Spirit.”*

And when God lives inside us, his love lives inside us. He fills us with his love for us and his love flows out from us to others. Verse 12:

*No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.*

If God lives in us, it will be evident in how we love other people. And this is particularly true of our love for one another as Christians. And this is our final point:

## **b. So we must be loving family together**

And this applies to us here at St Mary's. God has called us to be a family together. He is our Father and when we trust in Jesus we are adopted into his family, so we are his children. And that makes us brothers and sisters. Verse 21:

*“And he has given us this command: anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister.”*

Here at church, we are not just members of some club. We are not just people who turn up to the same building on a Sunday morning. We are a family.

Think of how well you know your natural brother or sister. Or if you don't have a brother or sister, perhaps you have a friend who you think of as a brother or sister. We should be getting to know each other on that level.

Think of what lengths you would go to help your brother or sister in need. You would do anything, we're family! Well that's how much we should love and care for one another in the church family.

Now, talk of family might make some of us think of broken relationships. I guess many of us will know that family relationships can be hard and it can be like that in the church family too. We are sinners, we are broken people, we will make mistakes, we may well upset each other from time to time. But in those times we need to remember how much God has loved us and forgiven us and so to extend that same love to each other.

*“Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister.”*

This is what God has called us to.

Well what will this look like practically? How can we grow to know each other and love each other as brothers and sisters?

We do have opportunities when we meet on a Sunday. That’s why we put on refreshments after the service, to give us time to talk together and share life together. But it doesn’t stop there. We also have mid-week groups – in the daytime and in the evening, where we look at a bit of the Bible together and again we get to know each other and find out how we can love each other.

Another really good way to grow as church family is to serve together. Whether it’s helping to run a regular church activity or volunteering for a one off event, we build relationships as we work together. If you’d like to find out how you can get involved, please do speak to me, or James, or to our churchwardens.

And let’s remember that our brothers and sisters aren’t just here in our local church. We are a part of the worldwide family of God. Let’s be finding out about, praying for and supporting our brothers and sisters in other places. Whether that’s other churches in this region, or in other countries, through our mission partners and through supporting persecuted Christians.

When we love each other like this, the world around us will see God’s love in us. That seems to be what verse 12 is saying:

*“No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.”*

So let’s love each other so much that it’s clear to the world around us that there’s something different about us. Let’s make the love of God visible through how we are family together.

Well clearly we have lots to chew on, in terms of how we can grow in love for each other. How will we ever do this? We can only do it because God has first loved us and God now lives in us, so it’s about God’s love flowing out from us.

Let’s pray and ask that he’ll make this a reality more and more in our own lives.
